Ten little Indian boys.

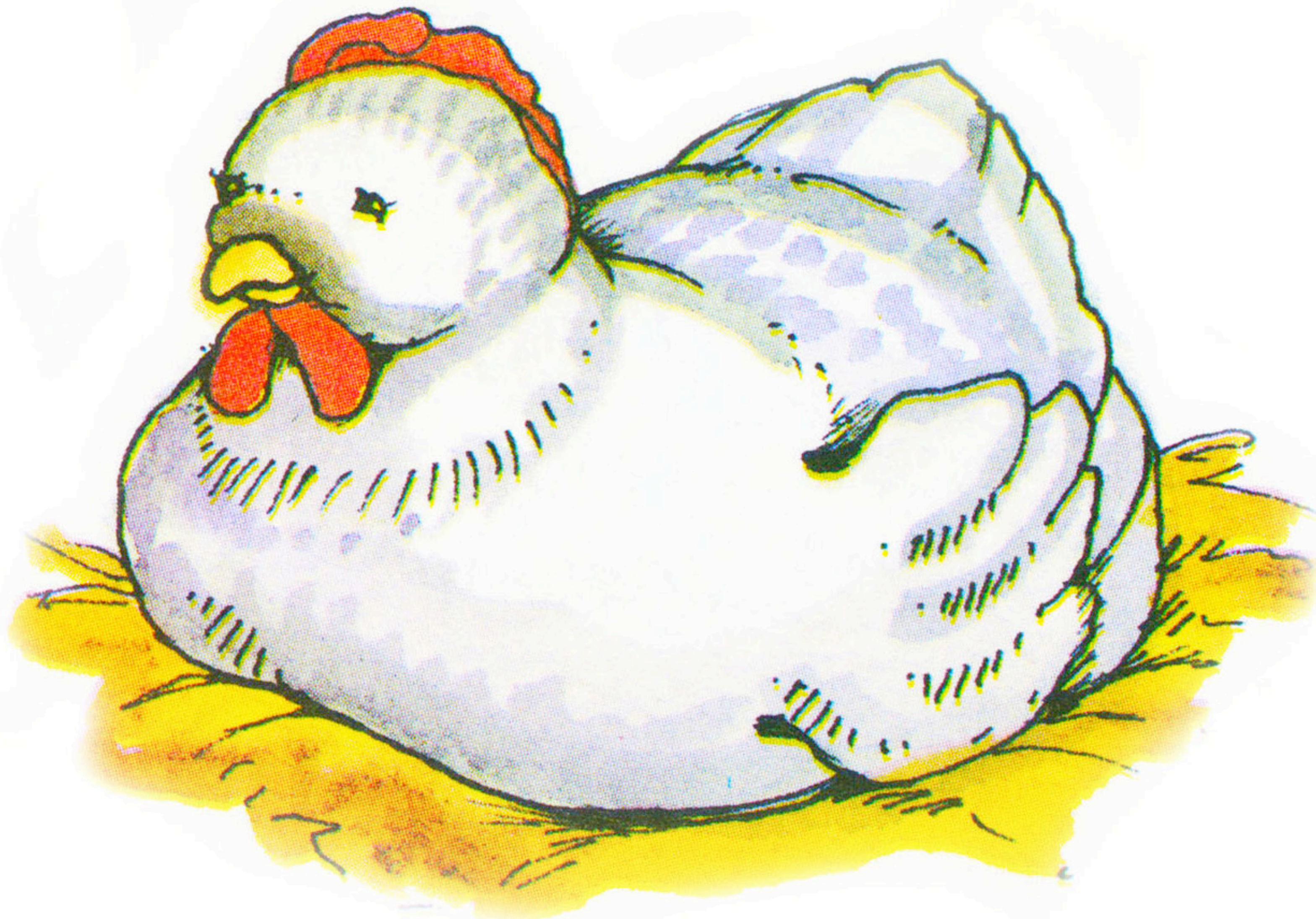
One, two,

Knock at the door;



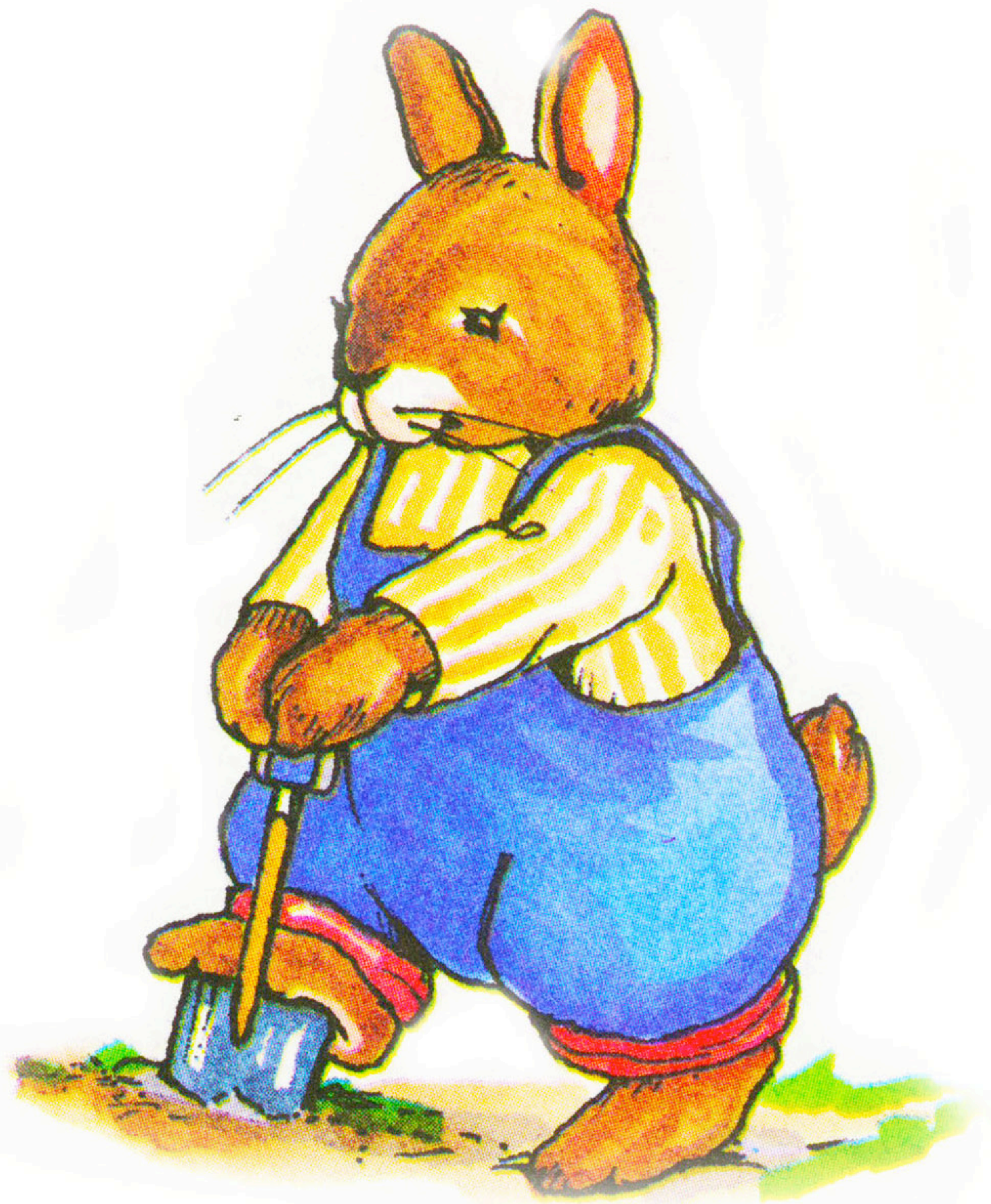
Five, six,

A big fat hen;



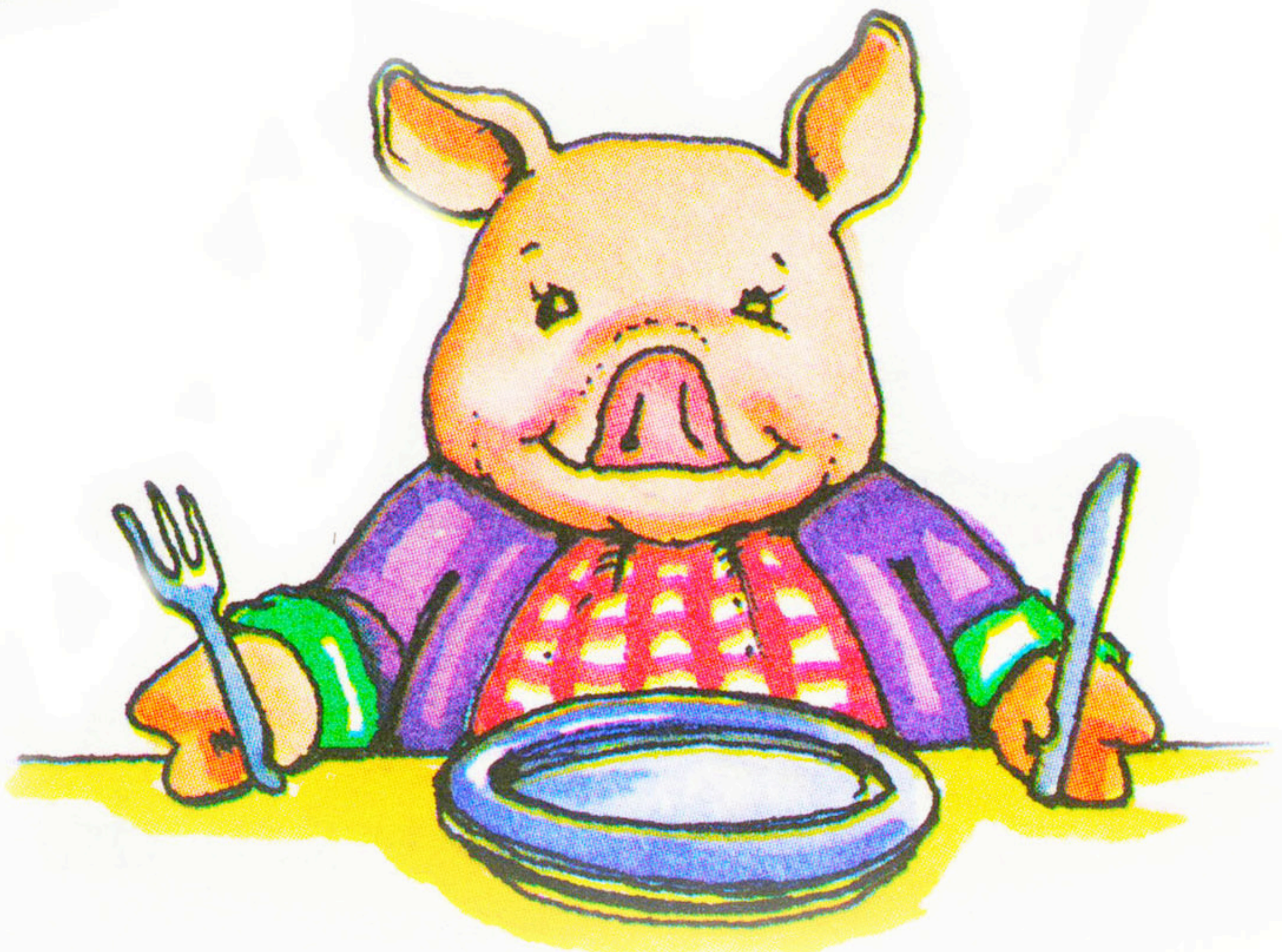
Eleven, twelve,

In satin vests and sorrel wigs.

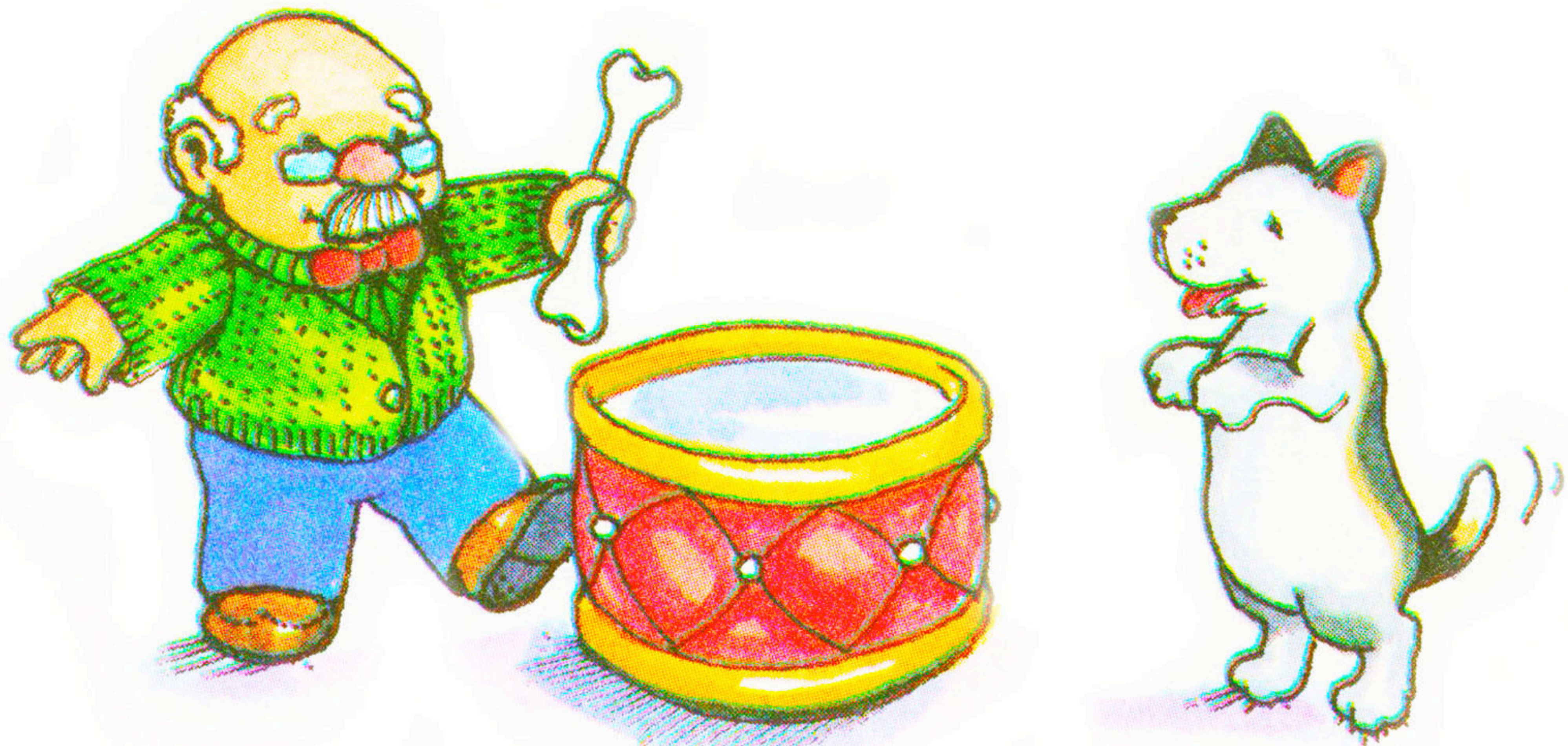


But suddenly it chanced to rain
And so they all went home again.

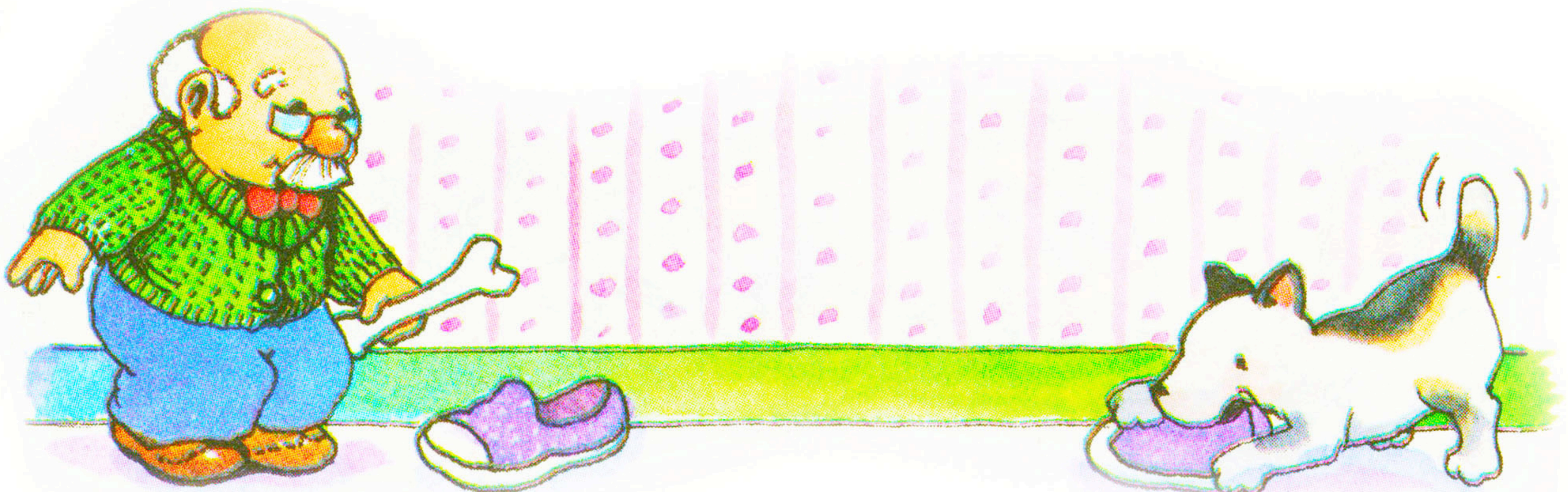


This Old Man

This old man came rolling home.



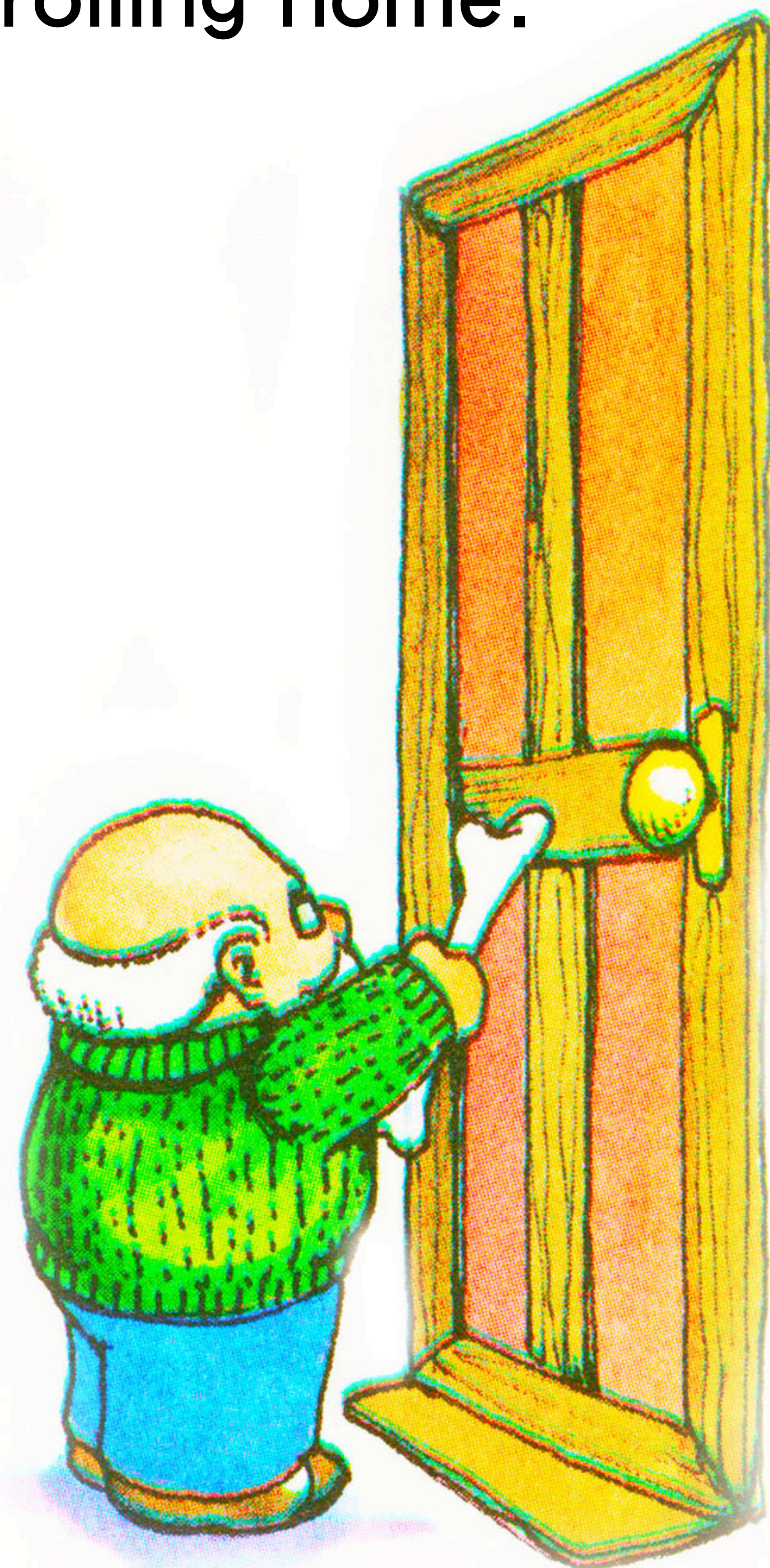
This old man, he played **two**,

This old man came rolling home.

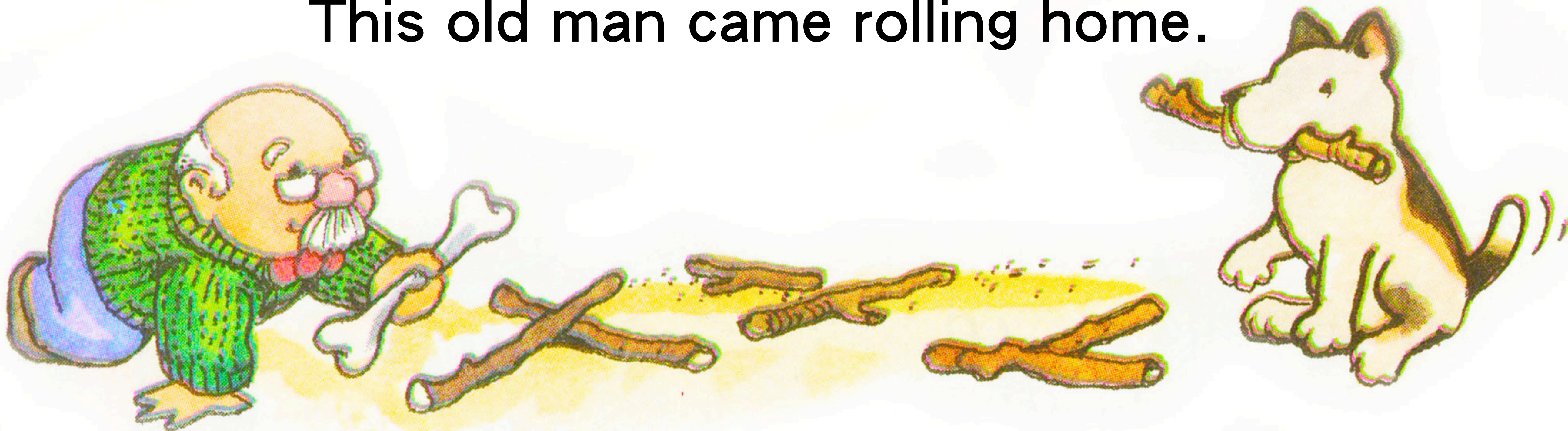

Ready, set, now here we go.



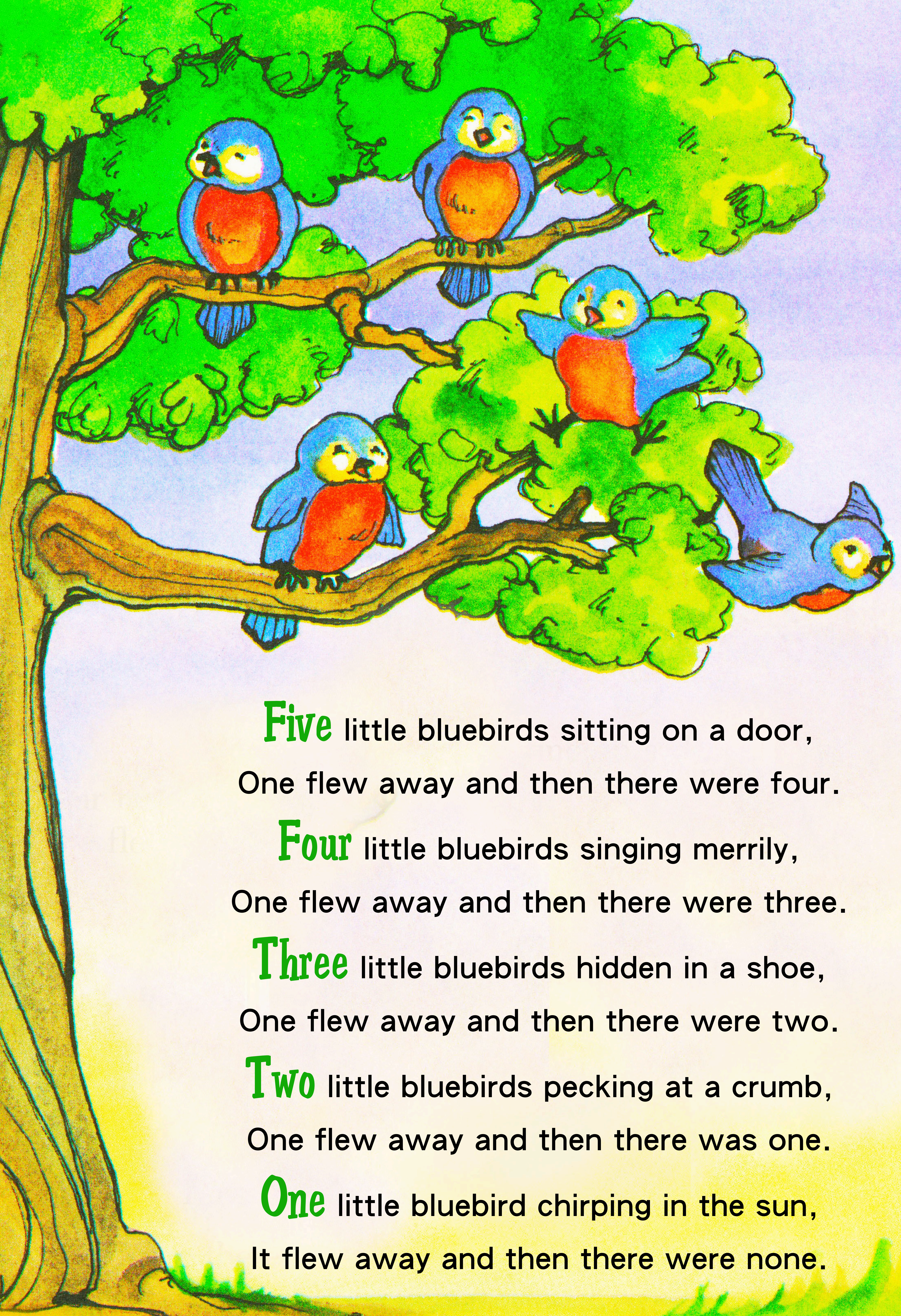
Ten little bluebirds perched on a pine,

One flew away and then there were three.

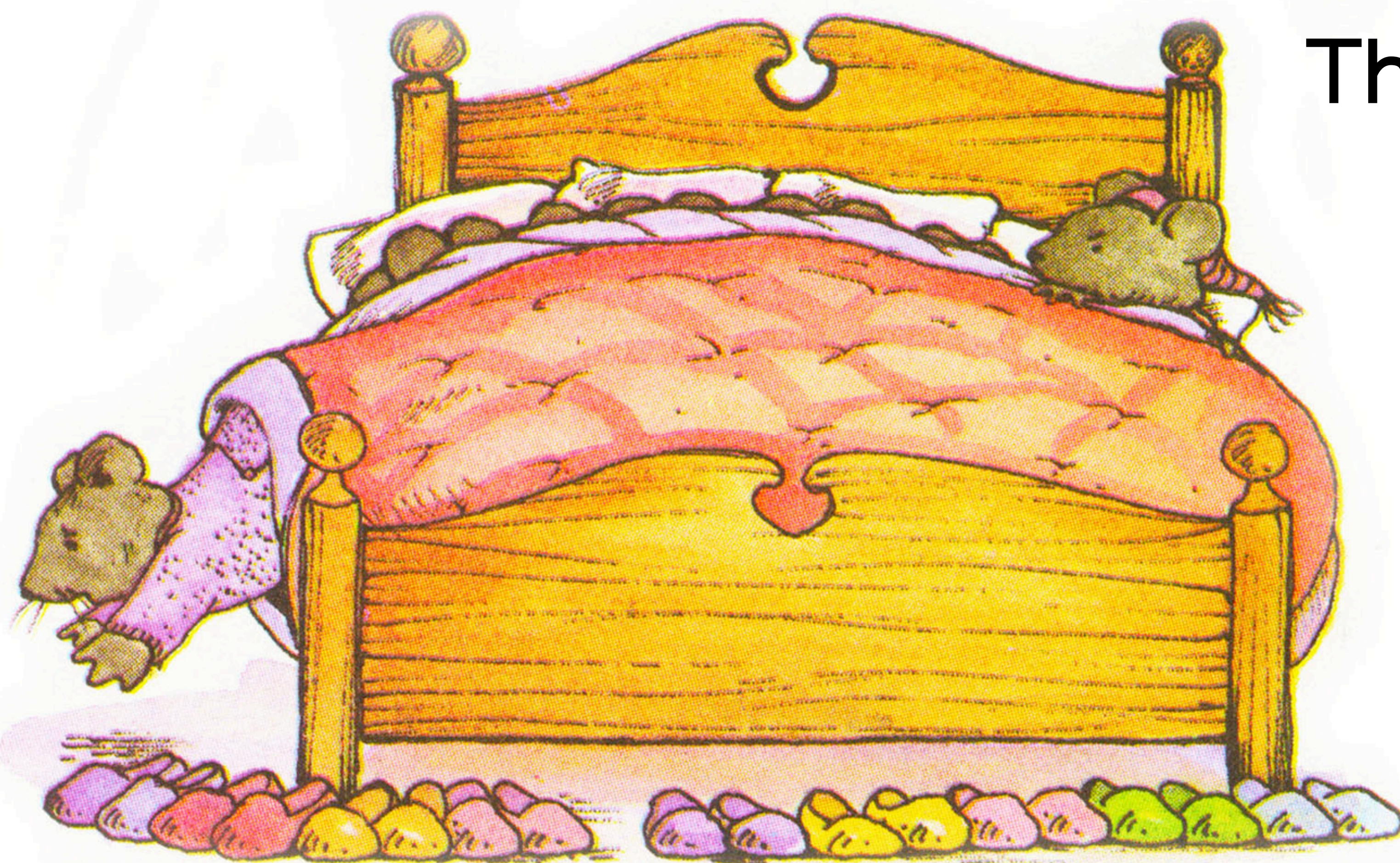
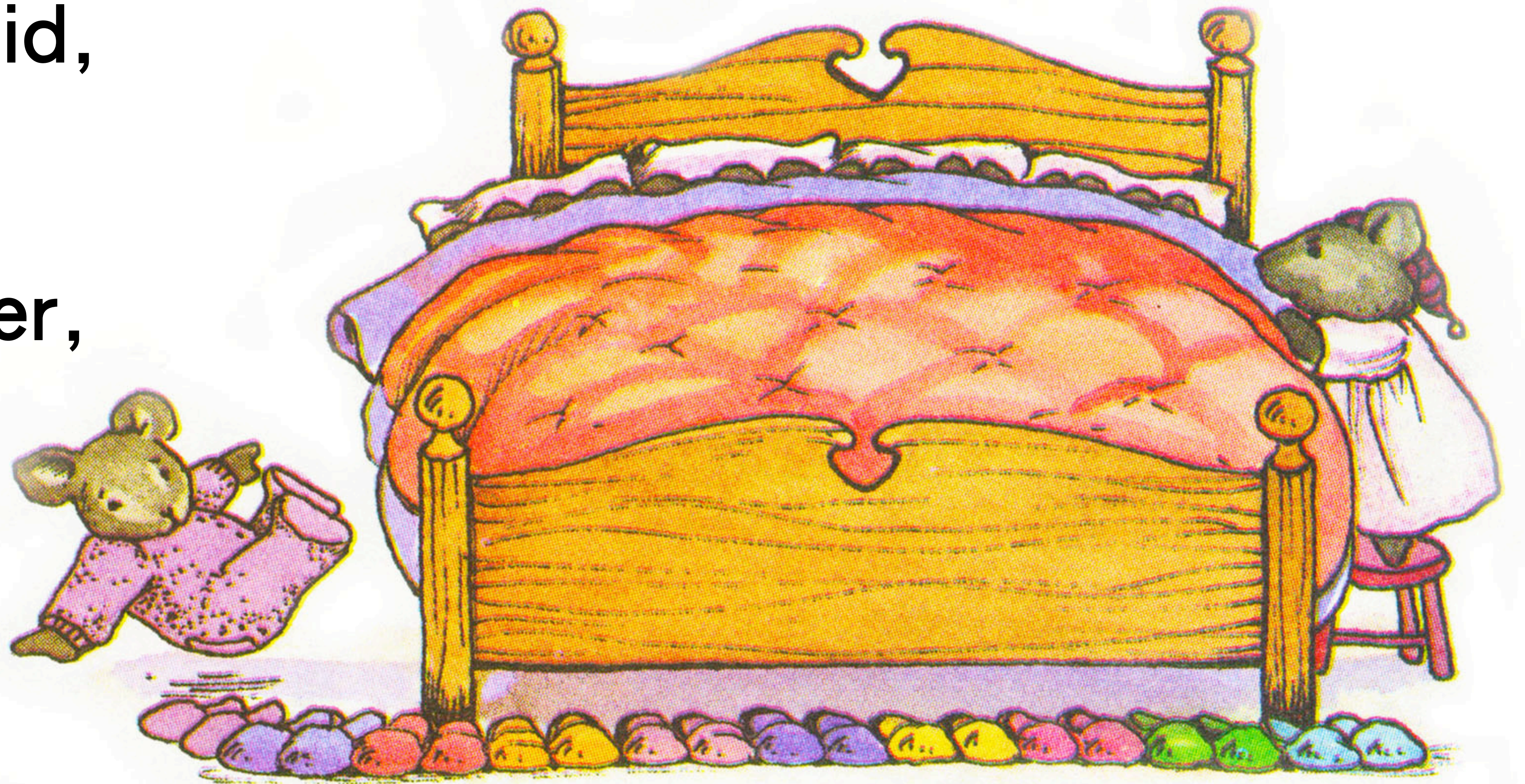
Three little bluebirds hidden in a shoe,

It flew away and then there were none.

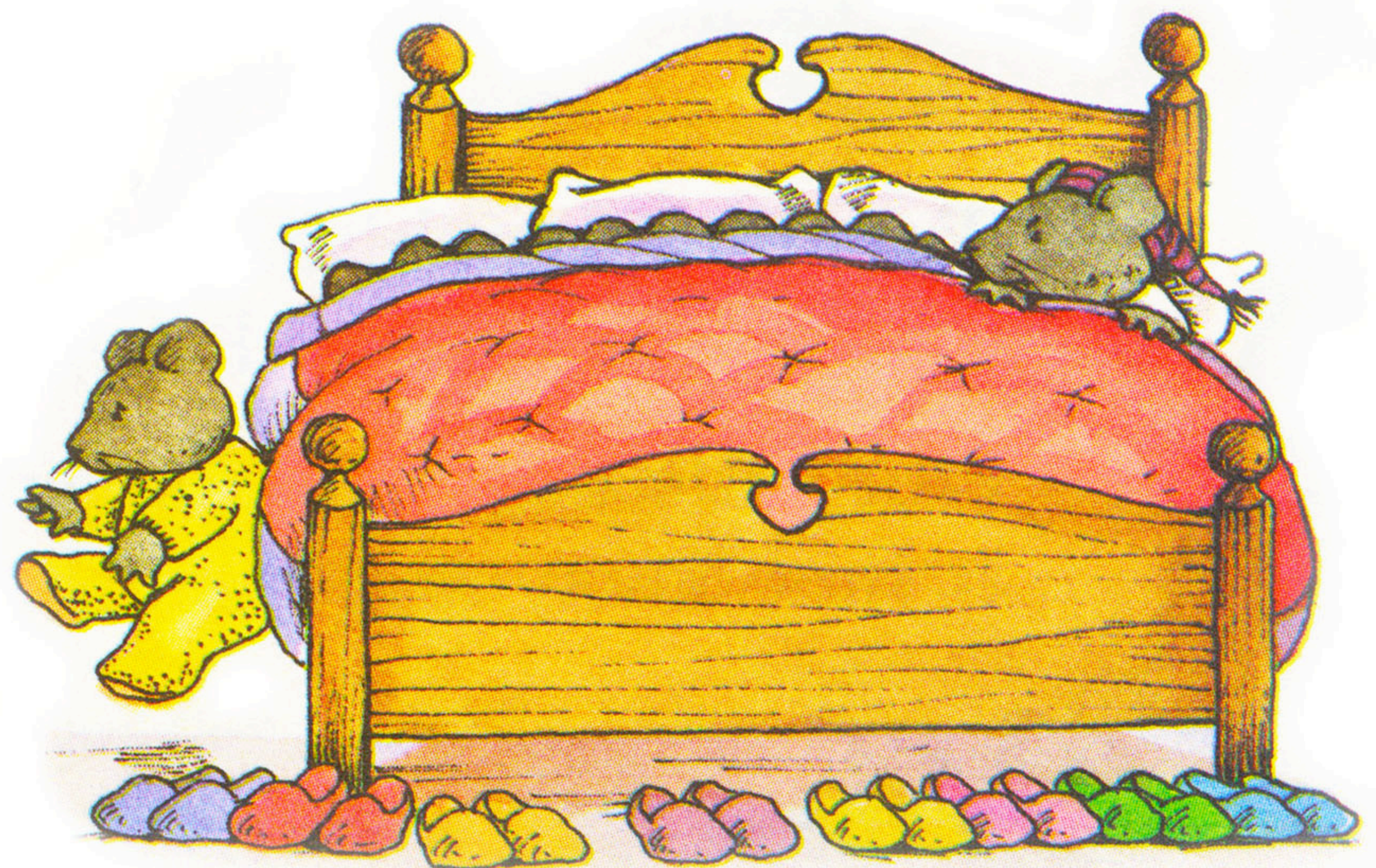
There Were Ten In The Bed

And one fell out.

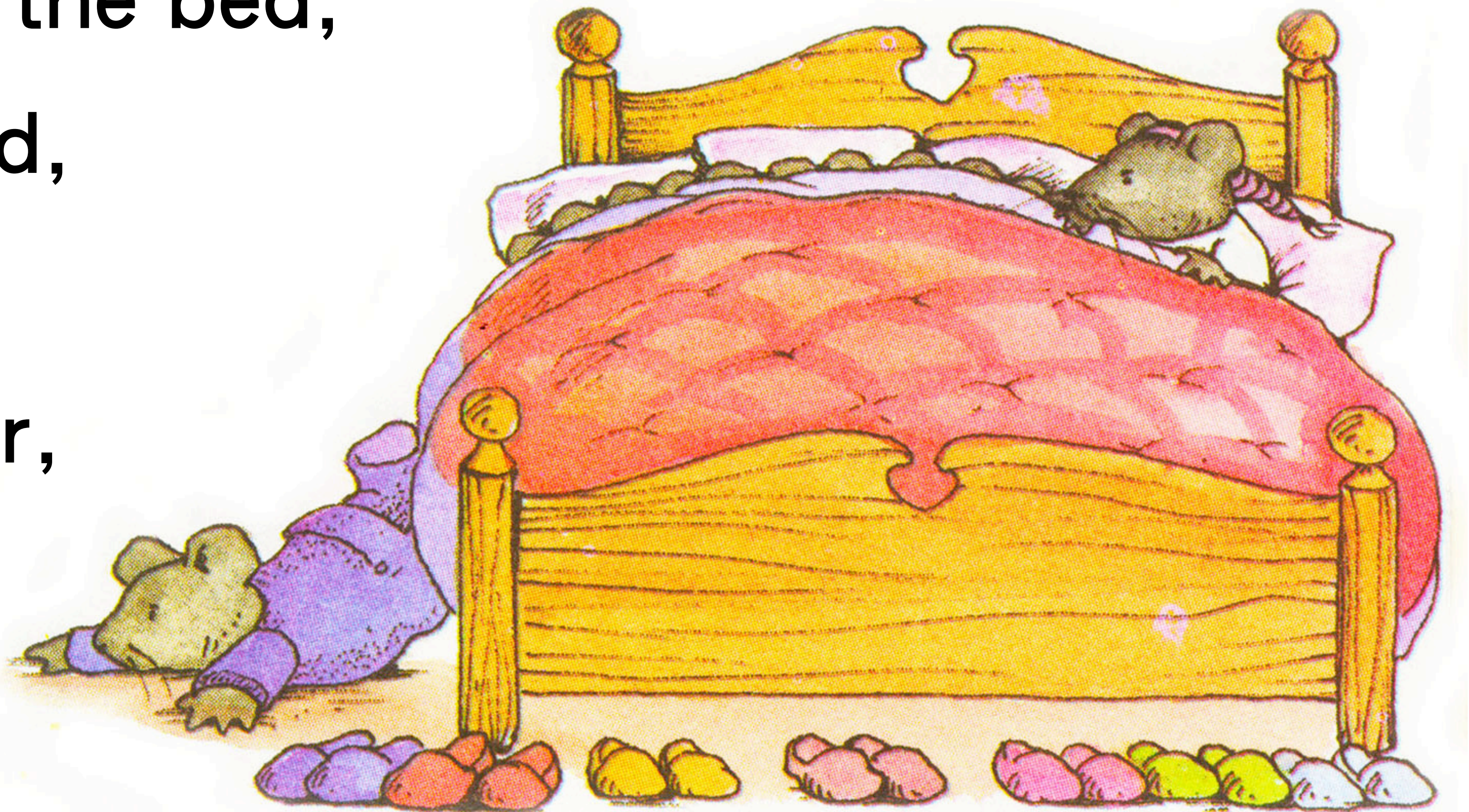


There were **nine** in the bed,

And one fell out.



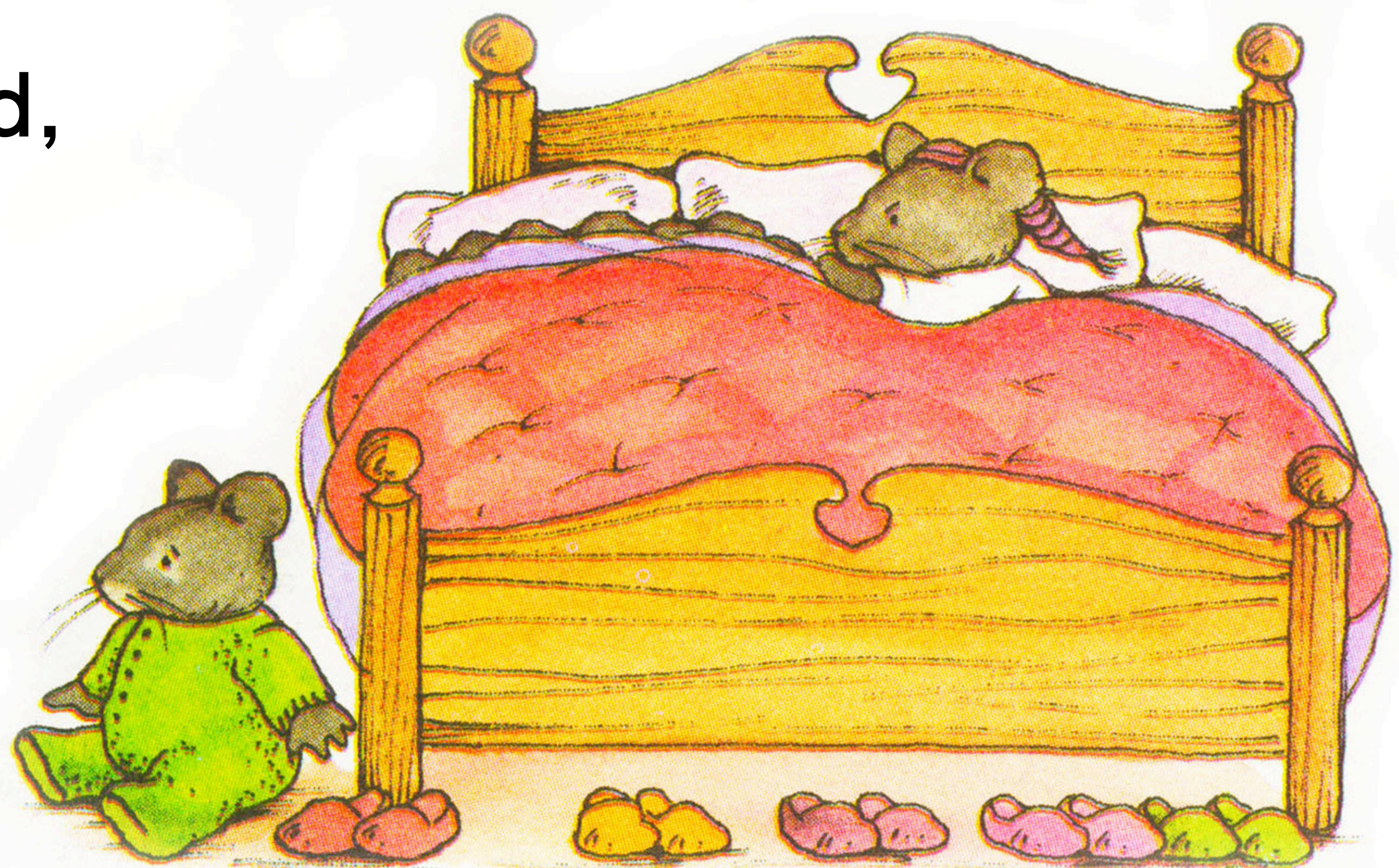
There were **seven** in the bed,

And one fell out.



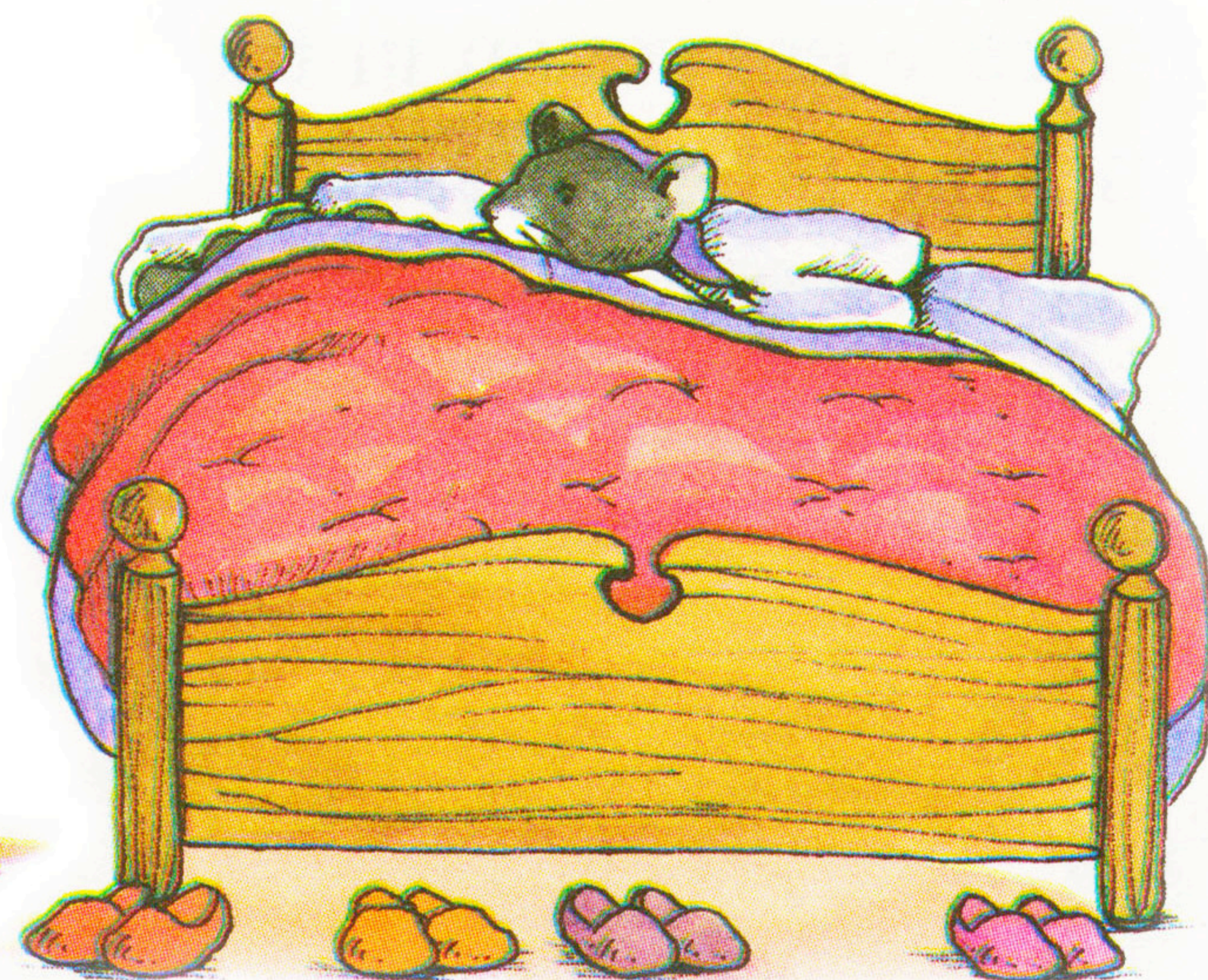
There were **six** in the bed,

And one fell out.



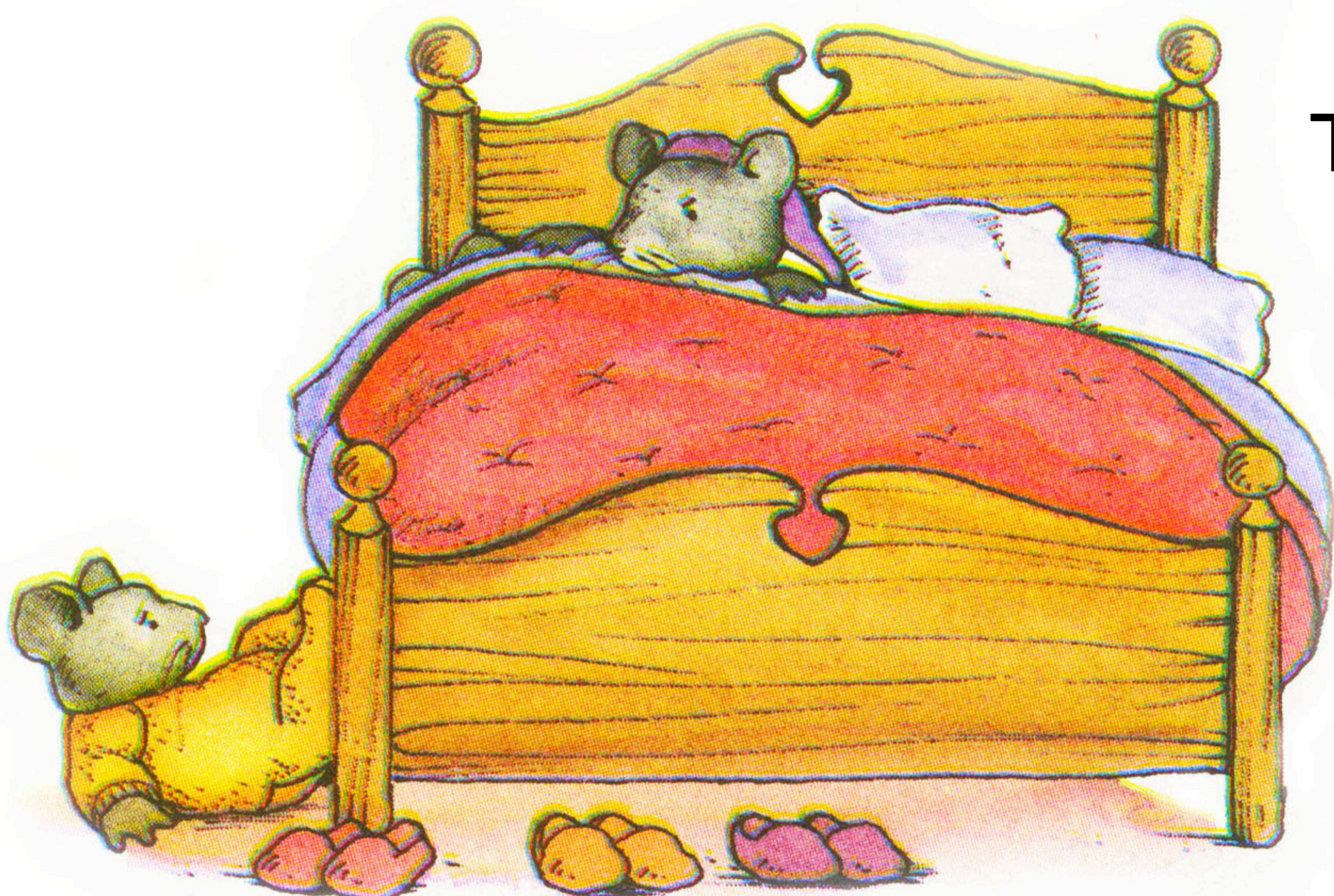
There were **five** in the bed,

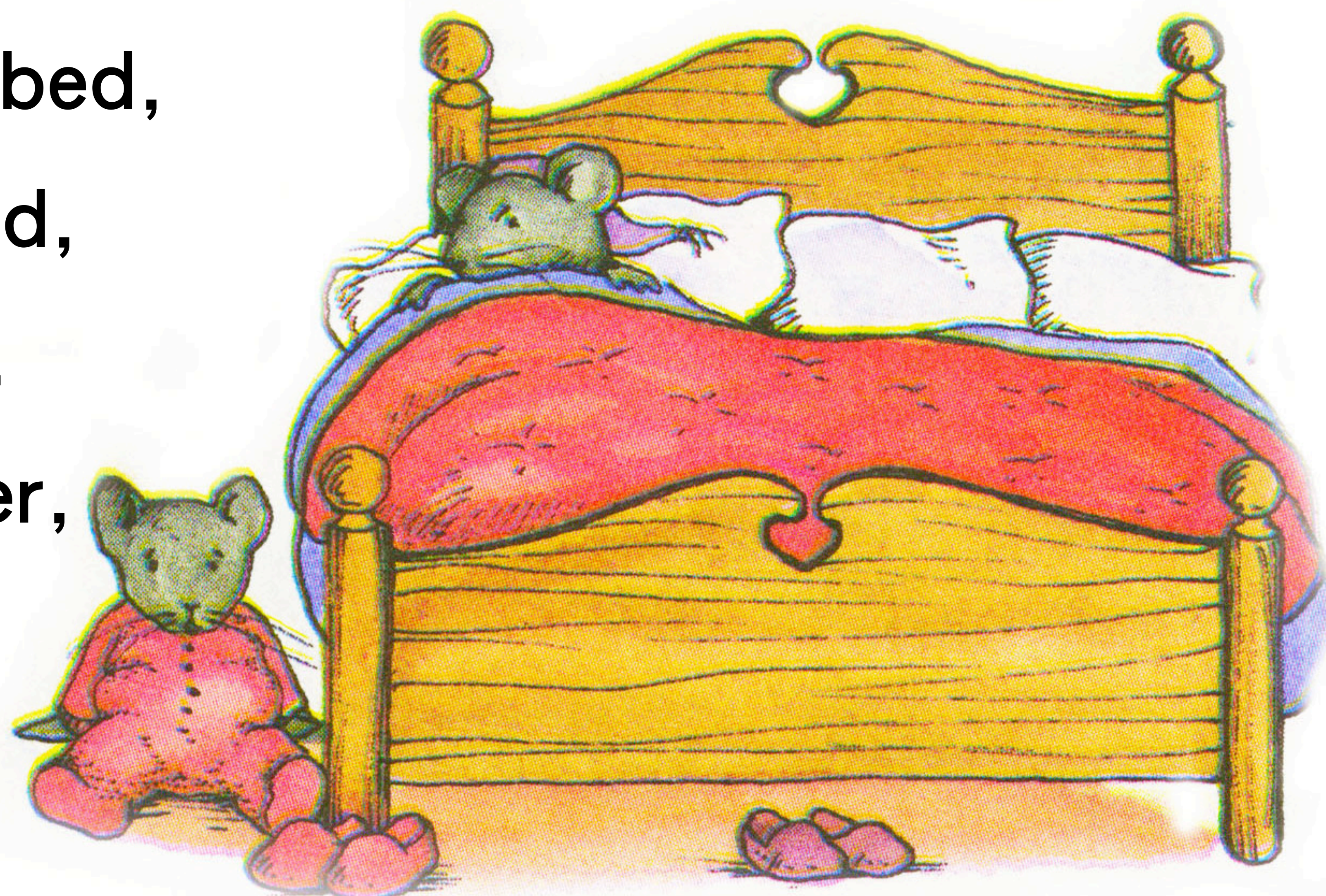
There were **four** in the bed,
